11. Care of the Natural World

Queries:

Fort Myers Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends Minutes of 11th Month 10, 2019

The Fort Myers Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends met in Iona House on 11th month 10th day with 13 Friends present. The Meeting opened with a period of silent centering.

Queries and Advices. Clerk Joan Culver read from the 11th month Queries regarding our responsibility to support Social and Economic Justice.

“Do we as individuals and as a Meeting do all in our power to end governmental, social, economic, and educational injustices in our community and to create equal opportunity for all?”

There was discussion that the “*all in our power*” was a large order and that keeping ourselves centered and healthy is a significant part of giving us the strength to end injustices.

Clerk’s Message. Clerk Joan Culver called attention to the importance of considering the Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business as a Meeting for Worship, and thus Spirit-led. Some of the same practices are appropriate, including holding silence after someone has spoken so that we may reflect and seeking guidance from Spirit. Comments and questions are addressed to the Clerk, who may respond or direct the question to someone who may have that information.

Preliminary Budget Meeting: Treasurer and Finance Committee

Joan Culver reminded the Meeting that this MFB is an informational and discussion meeting rather than a decision-making meeting. Decisions will be made in the December MFB.

The Finance Committee introduced a chart intended to show the “big picture” of the Meeting’s proposed use of our money in 2020 so that the Meeting may weigh those expenses against our intentions and values. The chart identifies five categories created by the Finance Committee from the line items of the 2020 budget requests. They are labeled SEYM; Spiritual Care of the Meeting; Local Giving; National/International Giving; and Fiscal/ Physical Care of the Meeting. A list of what items were included in each category was provided.

Treasurer Paul Davis presented a draft of the proposed 2020 Meeting budget developed from budgets provided by committee chairs to be considered by the MFB.

Some discussion followed regarding the SEYM apportionment. We will attempt to have more transparency about the process when SEYM asks for our contribution in the spring, remembering that the contribution is from the meeting as a whole.

New Business

Deb White announced that the Hospitality Committee asks people to bring their own cups to avoid using so many paper cups.

Helen Fox reintroduced SEYM's effort to have Meetings read statements acknowledging the native peoples who occupied the land in the areas where we meet. Helen read a draft of a statement she and Jim Koopman wrote. Friends expressed support for the statement but asked for an alteration to one of the sentences and will take this up again at the next MFB.

CNCP: The point was raised that our contract with CNCP is up in about two years. The Clerk will appoint an ad hoc committee to gather information for a discussion and/or threshing session within a few months.

The Meeting Minutes were read and approved. The Meeting ended in silence.

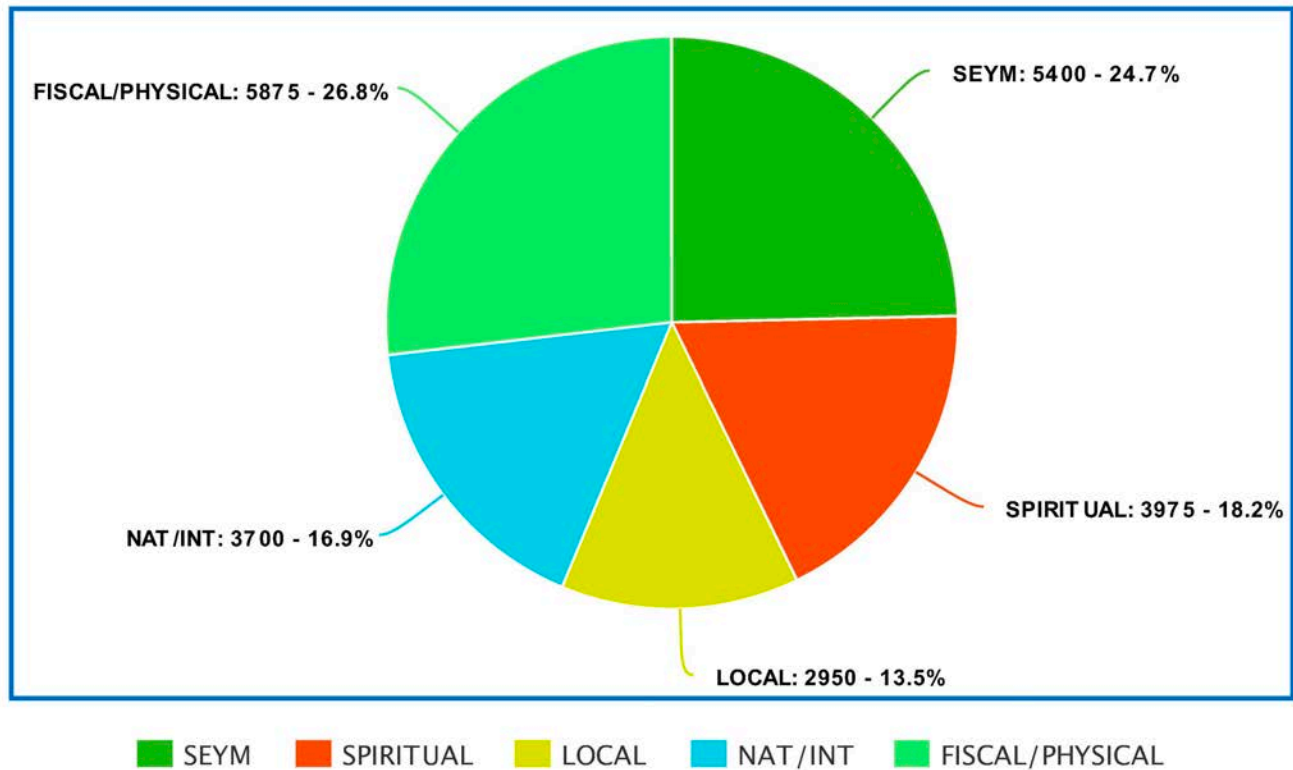

Four Doors to Meeting for Worship

The author of this well-loved pamphlet is William Tabor, a Pendle Hill teacher, a retreat leader, and an author who writes about the spirituality of Quakerism as well as Quaker history and practice.

Bill began consciously thinking about the future of Quakerism late in the 1960's. This concern has never left him. His metaphor of the four doors to worship grew from his sense of need for an explanation, or in some ways as a guide, as to what happens in a deeply centered, contemporary Quaker meeting. He presents worship as a reality that is ever present, a stream into which we can enter at any time. One way of entering this stream is to imagine a series of four doors through which we pass as we enter, pass through, and reach the final door "the door beyond" of meeting for worship.

This is a beautiful and well written piece of Quaker spiritual writing that has been a best seller since its first printing in 1992. It has been reprinted three more times; the latest printing was in 2018.

Our Meeting's Religious Education Committee is sponsoring a session focused on this pamphlet, guided by Roxy Jacobs, following worship on Sunday, November 17. Bring a brown bag lunch to tide you over.

1st Day Worship on 17 November will include the renewal of marriage vows by Erica Lynne and Bradley Musser. Erica & Brad were married under the care of the Meeting 10 years ago, (Erica was a long term member of Fort Myers Meeting before withdrawing from the Meeting several years ago). Following the tradition of the marriage ceremony, they will rise out of the silence as led and share their vows. The worship will otherwise follow the normal silence and sharing from the silence.

L.I.F.E. Update:

This fall the board members of L.I.F.E. (Lee county Interfaith For Empowerment) decided to continue our work to make rental housing in Fort Myers more affordable AND to continue our work to increase services for children in Lee County. In October, members of L.I.F.E. gathered together and voted to concentrate on finding a solution to childcare problems that were shared during 'house meetings' within each congregation. This month, at a recent DART conference (parent organization of L.I.F.E.), we learned that several other county organizations in Florida have or are still working on the affordable housing problem. Although it took 5 years, one county was successful in getting funding for an Affordable Housing Trust Fund. This month we will form a Child Care Committee and an Affordable Housing Committee to continue the "Research" work to determine what needs to be done to begin to solve these problems locally and who we need to ask to do it. I will try to keep you informed of our progress as we work towards our annual Nehemiah Action assembly which will be held March 9.

The Pendle Hill Quaker Institute: Practicing Our Heritage of Mysticism and Resistance **Dec 12-15, 2019**

From earliest days, Quakers have sought to attend and follow the Inward Light, the Inner Teacher, as the only true guide to right action. And from earliest days, Quakers have been moved and guided by the Inner Teacher to act conscientiously in the world to “see what Love can do” to mend a world rent by injustice and oppression.

In contemporary Quaker circles, we sometimes hear Friends speak of contemplative Friends and activist Friends, implying a false dichotomy – that some Friends are mystics and others are actively engaged in mending the world. To be faithful to our tradition and to the leadings of the Light, we are both seekers after the Truth as revealed to us in prayer and worship and animators of the Truth that is revealed to us. We participate both in mysticism and resistance to the ways of the world by standing and moving in revealed Truth.

In this extended weekend together, we will hear plenary speakers, engage in extended worship, and explore both our heritage and what Spirit asks of us today in mending a broken world and creating the Beloved Community.
