Fort Myers Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends Minutes of 12th Month 13, 2020

The Fort Myers Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends met online on the 12th month 13th day via Zoom conference with 23 Friends present. The Meeting opened with a period of silent centering. Richard Frechette, Clerk, read the Friends Peace Testimony of 1660, followed by two Queries from SEYM's Faith & Practice on the Peace Testimony & Nonviolence:

- Do we seek consistently to carry out this testimony for peace in all our relationships, including family, community, and work life?
- Do we as individuals and as members of a meeting seek to take part in the ministry of reconciliation between individuals, groups, and nations?

In response, a Friend suggested that we expand our notion of "war" to include psychological warfare and the manipulation of truth.

Paul then presented the 2021 draft budget to Friends, noting that there were no changes from the first draft presented in November.

Discussion: Friends discussed raising the amount for the Harry Chapin Food Bank, which provides food to individuals and food pantries in five counties. Before the pandemic, The Food Bank was spending \$37,000/month on this service; now, they are spending \$1 million/month, as hunger is much more widespread. Friends were in unity to increase that line item from \$500 to \$3,500.

Peace and Social Concerns Committee Report

Responding to a request from the membership of FMMM, the Peace and Social Concerns Committee will hold a discussion of their recommended book, "White Fragility" by Robin DiAngelo, on January 17, 2021 after Meeting for Worship. The PSC Committee will continue to recommend an anti-racism reading, a video or film, and an action to Ft. Myers Friends each month.

Update on the Hybrid Worship Initiative

"Hybrid worship" combines the physical presence of Friends at the Chickee Hut in Buckingham with Friends at a distance over Zoom. Barring technical difficulties, FMMM could begin hybrid worship on Sunday, December 27th. At that time, Friday worship at Buckingham would be replaced by the Sunday hybrid. Friends who gather physically would continue to socially distance and wear masks except when speaking. The Buckingham site can accommodate up to 24 Friends sufficiently spaced. After discussion, Friends approved the following Minute:

 Minute 2020-MM26: Friends approve moving to a hybrid worship format beginning 12-27-2020.

Since hybrid worship would not have been possible without a strong internet signal provided by a friendly neighbor to the Frechettes, the following Minute was approved:

Minute 2020-MM27: The Fort Myers Friends Meeting wish to formally thank Pastor Terry Vance of the Gunnery Road Baptist Church and his son John for providing technical assistance that will allow Friends to initiate hybrid physical and Zoom worship at the Frechettes' Buckingham property.

Future Place of Worship After much discussion, it was decided that the previously announced Threshing Session will be held on Sunday, January 3, 2021 via hybrid format after Meeting for Worship. Information on possible building sites, rentals of land or buildings, building designs and budget considerations is still being gathered and will be made available to Friends before the session. The purpose of the session will be for Friends to air their thoughts, feelings, ideas, objections, and, not least, their spiritual leadings about a future place of worship. In order to include as many Friends as possible in this session, those who cannot participate physically or via Zoom will be asked to

write down their thoughts and send them to the Clerk to be read at the session. The facilitation of the Threshing Session will be done by the Clerk, who might set some guidelines for speaking. If everyone speaks only once until all who want to speak have spoken, we expect the session to be reasonably orderly and inclusive.

Noting that most of those present had been on Zoom for nearly four hours, the Meeting closed in silent worship at 2 PM. Today's Action Minutes will be formally approved at the next Meeting for Business.


PSC December Challenge to Action



Books:


Amazing Peace: A Christmas Poem. By Maya Angelou. Ages 4-8 (and adults).

History of a Kind of Paradise © Helen Fox 4/1/2020

In the year of our Lord 1513 One Juan Ponce de Leon having made himself rich from the blood and tears of native people throughout the Caribbean islands sailed north to discover new lands make himself famous and trade worthless trinkets for gold.

But the temper of La Florida (as he called it) was very different from what he had imagined. The natives of the land were very Harsh and Savage and Warlike and Ferocious and Indomitable and not at all accustomed to abandoning their liberty so easily at the discretion of foreign men. So everything went astray in a few short days and Juan Ponce was struck by an arrow and repaired to Havana to die.

Years passed until the king of Spain understanding there was neither gold nor precious metals to be had allowed purveyors of the faith to journey to La Florida to baptize the population as it was well known that natives who have accepted the One True God and have burnt their idols cut their hair planted corn and agreed to dress in the Spanish manner are more docile. But docile they would not be. Instead, they argued, and when argument failed they laughed, and turned their backs and fouled the priest and his relics with excrement and withdrew their labor from the garrison and retreated to the thorny wilderness

And so their uninvited guests were forced to leave the southwest coast. For seven generations the people lived in peace knowing, however, from tales of the sheer size of the Spanish treasure fleet the sting of their steel bayonets and most of all the prescient voice arising by some peculiar kind of foreign magic from strange designs sketched on leaves of their most holy object that their way of life was doomed. To the north, Great Powers raged, England, France, and Spain vying for land claimed as their own Yet Florida remained unsettled, verdant, lightly trod, primeval, streams and rivers brimming over, creeks and grasslands flooding season after season, mudflats, estuaries sustaining thousands, fishermen, seafarers, traders river warriors, painters, weavers brides and bridegrooms, families paddling up one watershed, down another visiting the neighbors, paying tribute, feasting on oysters catfish, mullet, snails and conchs, wild papaya, coco plum singing, praying honoring the sacred spaces, purging their bodies with the black drink, then running league after league in the heat until visions of their gods informed them of things unseen while the land. this bounteous land, blossomed, and offered its abundance. To civilized men. La Florida was water-drenched and wild a bug-infested, snake and alligator hell on earth until they came to understand that swampland can be tamed and made more docile. For the land does not argue, scoff, or turn its back but gives itself up, quietly, to shovels and pickaxes, pipelines, railways, roads filled with sand and shells and bones from ancient burials the remaining native families hunted, shot down sold into slavery decimated by typhus, measles, plagues from Old World cities hounded down the coast picked off one by one family by family until the few remaining chiefs and warriors and their ragtag bands agreed to throw themselves upon America's protection and to cede and relinguish all claim to the whole territory of Florida and be concentrated and confined to small metes and boundaries patrolled by government agents, watchful that everything would remain peaceful and orderly while armies of steel plows ravished the land and left it battered, scraped, and drained its great trees wrested from the earth

its rivers fouled

its worthless soil infused with foreign magic its wildflowers mowed into surrender its forest paths choked with traffic. And yet, as sun-starved settlers from the north pile in season after season this patient land, its ancient souls still living deep in its embrace, this bounteous land, waits quietly for redemption.
