Memorial Minute for Tom Jacobs

Tom Jacobs was born into a farming family in Valparaiso, Indiana on December 25, 1961. Tom was first and foremost a farmer, with a love for the land, for the seasonal cycles of the natural world, and for animals. He completed a degree in engineering and worked for years as a project engineer, but he never gave up farming, first with his father and then with his stepson Carey, until the family farm was sold. Tom was a quiet, gentle soul whose nature was to help others in whatever way he could.

In 1985 Tom and Roxy Thalmann were married in Valparaiso under the care of Duneland Friends Meeting. Tom became a source of strength for stepchildren, Heidi, Ron, Carey, and Darian, and later for their children.

While Tom never became a formal member of Duneland Friends Meeting, he was a faithful presence at many Quaker gatherings. He was generous with his time and his skills and could be counted upon to help young Friends with woodworking.

Tom and Roxy moved to Arcadia, Florida in 2017, and connected with the Fort Myers Monthly Meeting. Tom immediately became involved with the life of the Meeting, participating on Properties and Hospitalities committees. He and Roxy also became emissaries to Misión Peniel in Immokalee FL, transporting food and other supplies to their distribution site. In May 2019, Tom was welcomed into membership with the Fort Myers Monthly Meeting.

Tom battled for a number of years with early-onset Alzheimer's disease. He chose to participate in an Alzheimer's disease research project with hope to find a cure. In 2022, for safety reasons, Tom was placed into institutional

care. Roxy maintained loving contact with him until his passing on March 12, 2023.

Memorial Minute for John Thomas Battin

John Thomas Battin, son of Harry E. and Phyliss Bovingdon Battin, was born on July 25, 1942, in Albany, New York and died in Ft. Myers, Florida on April 9, 2023, at the age of 80. He is survived by his sons, John Christopher Bovingdon Battin, Samuel Frost Battin, and Gregory English Battin, and by his sister Joan Mahlan and his brother Harry Battin. Evelyn Battin, his beloved wife of forty years, died in 2008.

John was educated at the Albany Academy, The Lawrenceville School, and Hamilton College. Before beginning his life's career in banking, he served in Vietnam and was awarded the Bronze Star for valorous conduct in combat. He was an active member of the Albany NY Vietnam Veterans Memorial Committee. His participation was integral in the funding and building of the memorial which was dedicated in 1993.

After Evelyn's death, John moved to Ft Myers. His son Sam moved to Ft Myers as well and was with him in the last years of his life. John quickly became a regular attender at the Ft Myers Monthly Meeting and kindly offered his expertise, becoming the Meeting Treasurer as well as working with another Quakers to help small business owners in the community with loans. For many, John is best known for his activist work for a better community and world. He was a member, co-clerk and clerk of our Peace and Social Concerns Committee and a representative of our Meeting to Lee Interfaith For Empowerment, a group working with social justice issues in the county. John was often side-by-side with other Quakers in rallies for environmental and justice issues. Equally dear to him was his work with VFP (Veteran's for Peace). While strong in his commitment to peace, to anyone who inquired about his time with the Marines, he spoke honestly about not only the negative consequences of his service but also the positive aspects of his own military experience, reminding us that there is Light even in the darkness.

Always kind and thoughtful, John brought joy and good fellowship to everyone he met through his hard work, reliability, razor-sharp mind, keen wit, excellent sense of humor.

Meetinghouse Committee

Meetinghouse Committee Clerk Helen Fox gave the following report:

The Meetinghouse Committee met with our architect, Jeff Mudgett, and Engineers Jack Morris and Autumn DeBarr on July 23rd at the office of Parker, Mudgett, & Smith to discuss the results of the engineering survey and to make adjustments to the architectural plan as needed.



We briefly discussed the possible need for a fire hydrant, a sidewalk to the existing bus stop, and a connection to the Unitarians' water system. The main topic was the preservation of a number of mature oaks and pine trees on our site. One of the trees is dying and must be removed. Three 8" diameter pines must be removed where the building will be constructed. One more tree must be cut to accommodate the road from the parking lot to the building. However, the five pines at the edge of the preserve and several large oaks can be saved with slight

modifications to the design: moving the building slightly, redesigning the parking spaces, lengthening the driveway, and reducing the size of the drainfield.

Jack will design the landscape to "code minimum." Friends will add native plantings around the building as desired.

Jack is "90% sure" that lighting will not be required in our small parking lot; however, we can add it if necessary, at a cost. The committee will ask the UU's their preference.

TIME FRAME

- End of July All parties meet with our builder, Tommy Lee Cook, to get cost estimates from both Tommy Lee and Jack. Jeff will provide the final site plan, which the committee will share with the Unitarians.
- August Jack and Jeff will apply for the necessary permits for sitework and building. Tommy Lee will bid on materials and labor.
- Sept-Oct Site and water management design will go to the County for first and second permit review. The committee will meet twice with all parties on the final site design.
- Nov. 1 Construction starts

Comments: Friend Suzanne added that she had gotten in touch with our general contractor, Tommy Lee Cook, since we hadn't heard from him in a long time. He texted back: "Everything looks good. All I have seen so far is as it should be; you have hired good people."

In response to a question, committee members explained that "water management" covers "incoming, outgoing, and surface water." Their conversation with the UU's will include whether we should be tapping into their source of county water or if we will have to have our own separate meter.

The committee was thanked for all their work so far.

There being no other items of business, the Meeting closed in silent worship at \sim 12:30 p.m.

A Request from the L.I.F.E. (Lee Interfaith For Empowerment) Organization

A call has been sent to Team Leaders of all member congregations of the LIFE organization to encourage us to attend the Fort Myers City Council Meeting on Monday, July 17 at 4:30. We are concerned about the lack of action from the City regarding the lack of affordable housing. The Affordable Housing Trust Fund that we worked for several years to convince the City Council to approve has money in it now but is not being used.

We plan to have LIFE members speak during the public comment section of the July 17th City Council Meeting. We will have scripts ready for people to use. We'd like a number from your congregation to know how many people we can expect from each congregation. This will only be effective if we bring people power. When one of our members addresses the Council we will urge every LIFE member to stand at their seats in solidarity.

Anyone willing to speak will be given a script and needs to arrive at 3:45 to complete the paperwork. All others should arrive no later than 4:15. The lack of affordable housing is so critical and we have won too much to let it slip away. If you live in Lee County, please seriously consider attending.
